

# Artisans' Co-op welcomes new member

Ontario's longest running artisans' co-operative, Deep River's own Valley Artisans' Co-op, welcomes a new member this summer.

Carole Pinard is a dual media artist, working in traditional stained glass for both abstract and narrative images, and also in oil to produce Canadian landscape paintings inspired by work of Canada's own Group of Seven.

Carole is a French Canadian born and raised in Ottawa by parents who exposed her to many different media and artists during her formative years.

She pursued her interest in the arts through university, graduating from the University of Ottawa with a Bachelor of Arts in Visual Arts and Psychology and a Bachelor of Arts in Education.

Following graduation she continued to develop her painting skills on her own, incorporating her love of art into her lesson plans as a primary school French Immersion teacher.

Two years ago Carole received coaching from noted Ottawa artist, Gordon Harrison, which led to her inclusion in the exhibition "26 Brushes and 52 Hands," held at the Harrison Gallery in Ottawa.

She continues to draw inspiration for her landscapes from her environment.

Fifteen years ago Carole's love of colour and light in oil painting led her to develop an interest in stained glass.

Her first classes were taken with her father and she says, "I was hooked!"

She continued to take all the courses she could find in this versatile medium, creating traditional narrative and

"Splitting Atoms – Canadian Style" by Jeremy Whitlock will be the next presentation by the Chalk River branch of the Canadian Nuclear Society and the first talk to this year's Deep River Science Academy students.

This presentation will briefly cover the history of Canada's nuclear program, its current status, and its promise for the future.

It will include a survey of some of the benefits and challenges of the technology.

Questions will be welcome and some nifty demonstrations will be attempted.

The speaker is Dr. Jeremy Whitlock, manager of non-proliferation and safeguards at AECL Chalk River.

Dr. Whitlock has been with AECL since 1994, starting as a reactor physicist involved with CANDU and research-reactor development.

He has been active in the Canadian Nuclear Society since his student days, acting as president in 2003-04 and is currently the communications director.

Dr. Whitlock grew up in the Ottawa Valley, and believes that canoes are the closest humans have come to creating a perfect machine.

Members of the public are welcome to attend.

Dr. Whitlock's presentation will take place at 6:30 pm, Thursday, July 10, in the Bennett / Mackenzie Room of the JL Gray Centre (entry via rear security entrance).

More details to come next week.

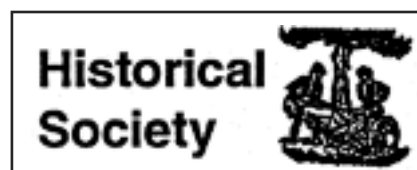
