

# Library Arts Committee to present Hazel Herriot retrospective

Hazel Herriot, long-time resident of Deep River, former art teacher at Mackenzie High School, and highly ambitious and prolific artist for 70+ years, is to be celebrated in an upcoming exhibition of her works.

The Deep River Library Arts Committee (LAC) will present "A Retrospective: The Art of Hazel Herriot" which opens November 17, and runs until November 29 in the program room of the Deep River Library.

Hazel has produced work in a wide range of media that will be presented in the show.

These will include: drawing, painting, rug hooking, spinning, felting, copper enameling, jewelry and batik. All works will be for sale.

One of Hazel's early artistic influences came in her college years in Saskatchewan when a teacher brought students to the banks of the Wascana Creek in Regina.

She told them to draw and paint what they saw. Hazel says:

"This opened up an entirely new world for

me. As Lewis Carroll said through the mouth of Alice - 'the world is so full of wonderful things; I'm sure we should be as happy as kings.' Wow!"

If you have had the pleasure of meeting Hazel or seeing her work at the Valley Artisans Coop, or at Art on the Lawn or demonstrating her spinning at the School House Museum, you will know that she is a spirited artist and indeed seems to be still "happy as a king" when it comes to creating.

Opening night reception will be Monday, November 17 from 7-9 pm where Hazel will be present to chat with you.

The show continues until Saturday, November 29 and is open during most library hours.

Rehearsals for the augmented choir are at 8:30 pm on Wednesdays in the Church Sanctuary.

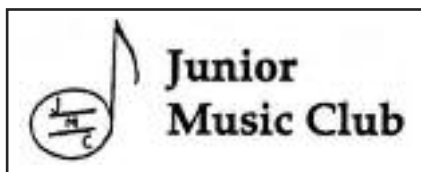
Congratulations Upper Ottawa Valley: the 10,000 Villages craft sale again realized over \$6,000!
